Living Lands & Waters Calls for Volunteers During Their Ohio River Tour

Since 1998 Living Lands & Waters (LL&W), has worked with over 97,000 volunteers to remove 8.7 MILLION pounds of marine debris from America's Rivers and they need YOUR help on this fall! The third stop on their 2016 Ohio River Tour is in Rising Sun, IN and they will be hosting several river cleanups in the area.

LL&W operates on a one-of-a-kind fleet of barges, known as the only "industrial strength" river cleanup operation in the world. There will typically be 2 cleanups a day: 9am-12pm and 1pm-4pm. Individuals, families, and groups are welcome; however we recommend volunteers be 12 years or older. Each time slot can accommodate up to 45 volunteers per day! We provide all necessary materials including: lunch, trash bags, gloves, life jackets, water, sunscreen, and bug spray.
